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


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
Action Plan Issue

Description of action plan and the process



Action Plan Timeline

Wednesday November 17, 2021: Sent out surveys (printed) to parents of our service learning students to learn more about their opinions on their child learning Japanese and how they feel about other potential opportunities for learning second languages in early education.

Friday November 19 and Wednesday December 1, 2021: Received parent surveys back from our students and collaborated with each other to gain a collective understanding of how our students' parents feel about second language education. Based on the parent survey feedback, we gathered all of our data to propose to the principal of Del Rey Woods Elementary school.

Wednesday December 1, 2021 Proposed our data findings to the principal of Del Rey Woods Elementary school, Lynn Ebora, so that she could likewise gain an understanding of how parents feel about second language learning opportunities.

We hope that our data findings will not only have an effect on Del Rey Woods Elementary (Integrating language courses into future curriculum /introducing more languages through the CPY program/etc.) but can also make way to the principal's own school board meetings to reach a larger audience.

Dear Mrs. Ebora, Principal of Del Rey Woods Elementary,

My service learning partners and I from CSU Monterey Bay have enjoyed our time offering Japanese language and culture lessons to the students of Del Rey Woods in the CPY afterschool program. During our time we have seen an incredible amount of excitement to learn the Japanese language from students. So much so, that there were more students who wanted to join our lessons than we would have been able to facilitate. Because of this immense response from the students, we decided to gauge the interest of their parents in regards to early education second language classes. We as foreign language and culture majors recognize the myriad of benefits one receives from learning a second language. Studies have shown that students who begin learning a second language at an early age are more likely to attain native-level pronunciation than older students. Students who are learning a second language also achieve higher grades on average in all subjects. Since I have budget for afterschool programs, I definitely will bring this data to a meeting and discuss a possibility to have Japanese classes near future.

Our Thoughts

Alyssa:

I was really surprised by the hospitality Del Rey Woods offered to us. Before our Thanksgiving break, both Ms. Ebora and Ms. Marrero expressed their support for us and even suggested potential opportunities to teach Japanese formally within the community. During our meeting with Ms. Ebora, I was shocked to learn that no other service learning groups had approached Ms. Ebora in the past 5 years of her role as an administrator. She didn't even know that the CPY Japanese leaders were CSUMB students. After finding that out, she expressed her increased willingness to help find a proper classroom for future groups as her son is also a university student. She seemed touched by our maturity and leadership, and told us that she hopes her son is able to do the same things we do.

When I told her I would like to become a Japanese teacher in the future, she even offered me an opportunity to work at Del Rey Woods after school to teach Japanese. The school has an after school budget that is separate from CPY, and would be under the principal's control (since she has no jurisdiction over CPY). She suggested that I relay my contact information to her and she would check out with HR and any after-school teacher programming to see if I could potentially teach as a student teacher with pay.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time teaching lessons to the students of Del Rey Woods Elementary. All of the staff, from CPY to the teachers and principal, were extremely accommodating and showed immense passion for their job assisting students.
